Tool Bags. Lenox says its new *Soft Storage Tool Bags* can stand up to any kind of job-site abuse. The wide-mouth Contractor's Tool Bag has 14 interior pockets and a compartment for small parts. The Bucket Tool Organizer has 22 interior and 12 exterior compartments and a shoulder strap. The Electrician's Tote and Plumber's Tote also have lots of pockets, plus trade-specific details like elastic loops. Unfortunately, none of the tool bags has a coffee-cup holder. Prices range from \$30 to \$65.

Multi-Tool. The *Striker Drywall Talon* is designed to lighten the load for drywall hangers. In addition to a standard utility blade, it has a built-in rasp for smoothing out rough edges, a serrated edge for making saw cuts, and — on the handle — a striking cap for dimpling imperfections and setting exposed nail heads. The blade housing opens and closes like a jackknife and has a thumb rest that the maker says reduces user fatigue. The tool costs about \$13.

Drywall Picker-Upper. There's no shortage of devices out there that can be used to lever a sheet of drywall into position using foot pressure, but the most effective one I've found is Marshalltown's Panel Lifter. Its distinctive feature is a boot strap that makes it easy to grab a panel and make adjustments completely hands-free. It's also handy

for hanging doors. It costs about \$25.
